People with a Primary Support Reason of Physical Support (Primary Care Support) represented 93% of adult social care service users in receipt of equipment in the period. A further 2% of service users had a PSR of Physical Support (Access and Mobility only).

Data shows that 78% of adult social care service users in receipt of equipment were White. 10% were from Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) Groups.

33.3% of service users in receipt of equipment in 2017/18 were Christian and 3.7% have no religion or belief. There is no record of religion or belief for 745 people (59.5%) in receipt of equipment. 44 service users (3.5%) in receipt of equipment in 2017/18 were affiliated to a minority religious group.
